A reminder...

The Functions of SECAC

Per Federal Statute, Public Law 110-134, Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007:

- Periodically conduct a **statewide needs assessment** concerning the quality and availability of early childhood education and development programs and services for children from birth to school entry, including assessing the availability of high-quality pre- kindergarten services for low-income children in Mississippi;
- Identify opportunities for, and barriers to, **collaboration and coordination** among Federallyfunded and State-funded child development, child care, and early childhood education programs and services, including collaboration and coordination among State agencies responsible for administering such programs;
- Develop recommendations for **increasing the overall participation of children** in existing Federal, State, and local child care and early childhood education programs, including outreach to underrepresented and special populations;
- Develop recommendations regarding the **establishment of a unified data collection system** for early childhood education and development programs and services throughout Mississippi;
- Develop recommendations regarding **statewide professional development and career advancement plans** for early childhood educators in Mississippi;



The Functions of SECAC continued...

- Assess the capacity and effectiveness of **2- and 4-year public and private institutions of higher education in Mississippi** toward supporting the development of early childhood educators, including the extent to which such institutions have in place articulation agreements, professional development and career advancement plans, and practice or internships for students to spend time in a Head Start or prekindergarten program
- Make recommendations for improvements in the **State Early Learning Guidelines** and undertake efforts to develop high quality comprehensive early learning standards, as appropriate

Per State Statute, Mississippi Code § 37-21-53:

- Assist the State Department of Education with the implementation of the Early Learning
 Collaborative Act of 2013
- Ensure coordination among the various agencies and programs serving preschool children in order to support school district's efforts to achieve the goal of readiness to start school
- Facilitate communication, cooperation, and maximum use of resources and to promote high standards for all programs serving preschool children and their families in Mississippi
- Carry out any **responsibilities assigned to SECAC by the Governor** and/or by applicable federal law.

Workforce Development and Retention Committee

<u>Proposed-</u> specific issues this committee will investigate and make recommendations about:

- Increasing the number of well-trained individuals across all sectors of early childhood system
- Increasing compensation and retention (in child care, early intervention and other EC sectors)
- Improving the preservice/credential programs for general and special education to include more practical application of the knowledge base
- Increasing provider access to professional learning for supporting children with special needs
- Adopting professional standards
- Strategies to address gaps in workforce development



Workforce Development and Retention Committee

Clarified-

- Priority: Adopting professional standards for a range of EC professionals.
- Priority: Increasing compensation and retention in child care, early intervention and other EC sectors.
- Increasing the number of well-trained individuals across all sectors of early childhood system, including opportunities for job-embedded professional development in real-world classrooms.
- Improving the preservice/credential programs for general and special education to include more practical application of the knowledge base.



Early Intervention Committee

<u>Proposed-</u> the specific issues this committee will investigate and make recommendations about:

- Increasing developmental screenings and access to related services
- Improving the funding structure of early intervention and early childhood special education
- Increasing the capacity of the workforce to provide quality services to children with special needs and their families.



Early Intervention Committee

Clarified-

- Improving the funding structure of early intervention and early childhood special education to increase recruitment and retention of providers.
- Increasing the capacity of the workforce to provide quality services to children with special needs and their families.
- Increasing developmental screenings and access to related services.



Policy, Accountability, and Data Committee

<u>Proposed-</u> the specific issues this committee will investigate and make recommendations about:

- Process and support for ongoing quality improvements for all settings
- Policy to practice feedback loops
- Accountability for programs and services to maintain quality and impact outcomes for children and families
- Longitudinal data system

Purpose of Asset Map & Strategic Vision

Questions the Asset Map Will Answer

- How are the children, families and the early childhood workforce involved with the MS early childhood system currently faring?
- What early childhood programs and services are available to children and families in MS?
- What funding exists for early childhood programs and services?
- What supports are available to make early childhood programs high-quality and effective?
- Are access, experiences and outcomes equitable?

The asset map will inform the creation of a **strategic vision**, which articulates a path for improvements towards a comprehensive, aligned, high-quality system of early childhood development and care.

- Analyze quantitative and qualitative data, identifying themes through data dialogues with stakeholders and SECAC.



Asset Map Process & SECAC Meetings

January 3, 2022

Presentation and discussion of asset mapping information gathered thus far through desk research and stakeholder engagement.

March 3, 2022

Presentation and discussion of asset map draft

May 5, 2022

Presentation of final asset map and posting to SECAC website.

Between the full SECAC meetings, Start Early will also seek feedback on the development of the asset map during monthly SECAC committee meetings as needed.
